

Organization of the Police Department

The Rockford Police Department is under the command of Chief Chet Epperson and has an authorized strength of 285 officers. The Department is comprised of the following bureaus:



☆☆ Administrative Services Bureau

The Administrative Services Bureau is commanded by Deputy Chief Lori Sweeney, who supervises the Evidence and Property, Accreditation, Recruiting, and Records Center Divisions, as well as the Computer Support, Payroll, and Fiscal Services Sections.



☆☆ Field Services Bureau

The Field Services Bureau is commanded by Deputy Chief Michael Booker. Deputy Chief Booker supervises the operations of all Patrol Shifts, Community Services, K9 Unit, and M3 Streets Team.



☆☆ Investigative Services Bureau

The Investigative Services Bureau is commanded by Deputy Chief Greg Lindmark. The Investigative Services Bureau is responsible for conducting follow up investigations on criminal incidents reported to the Rockford Police Department as well as initiating investigations.



☆☆ Support Services Bureau

The Special Operations Bureau is commanded by Deputy Chief Theo Glover who oversees the Traffic Division, School Unit, Central Reporting Unit, S.W.A.T. Team, Bomb Unit, Mobile Command Unit, Field Force Unit and Dignitary Protection Team.



☆☆ Office of Professional Standards

The Rockford Police Department's Office of Professional Standards (OPS) is commanded by Deputy Chief Dave Hopkins. The OPS consists of Internal Affairs, Training, Field Training Process, Armament Section and Administrative Review Process.

ROCKFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Rockford Police Department is an accredited law enforcement agency and meets the high standards of the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA).



In 2009, the Rockford Police Department was acknowledged by CALEA for meeting their formal, internationally recognized professionalism in policing standards. The CALEA program provides policing agencies the direction for developing comprehensive written directives and a foundation for producing sound management principles. The accreditation process not only strengthens accountability within an agency, it strengthens an agency's accountability to the citizens it serves and protects.

CALEA provides industry standards in professionalism for law enforcement agencies. According to the CALEA

website, www.calea.org, the accreditation process provides a mechanism "to systematically conduct an internal review and assessment of the agency's policies and procedures, and make adjustments wherever necessary to meet a body of internationally accepted standards."

The Rockford Police Department is in a period of preparing for our next "onsite" assessment scheduled for December of 2011. As part of the process, Investigator's Michael Triplett and Jason Mallo are responsible for making sure Rockford Police Department General Orders are reviewed, revised and updated to assure compliance with CALEA prescribed directives. Since beginning our participation in CALEA, we have made significant improvements in the areas of training, crime analysis practices and temporary detention policies. In achieving reaccreditation from CALEA, the Rockford Police Department will receive recognition from respected policing communities throughout the world as well as diminishing risk and liability.

What may prove to be the most noteworthy result of the CALEA reaccreditation process is its methodical advancement of an already strong management philosophy. In continuing to utilize the CALEA standards to drive the Department forward, we persist in our tireless endeavor to provide "Excellence in Services".

Department Information



The Rockford Police Department Training unit is charged with providing all members of the department with the best training possible, thereby enhancing their ability to protect the lives, rights, property, and quality of life of the citizens of Rockford. In 2010, the Training Unit continued to provide basic and advanced training to sworn police officers and civilian support personnel.

The Training Unit oversees all formal Department training, whether delivered by members of the department or expert instructors from around the nation.

The Training Unit ensures mandatory instruction to all personnel as well as offering elected courses to sworn officers. Through comprehensive practical training and continuing education programs, the Training Unit continues to meet existing training standards as well as addressing potential concerns that face law enforcement.

The Training Unit averages over one hundred hours of training annually for each of the sworn officers within the Department.

The Training Unit works with the Northern Illinois Training Advisory Board, the University of Illinois Police Training Institute, Northwestern University Center for Public Safety and the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.





Through objective and comprehensive investigations of allegations of Department employee misconduct, OPS safeguards the integrity and professionalism of the Department.

In 2010 the Rockford Police Department received 22 excessive force complaints. The above chart describes the outcome of these investigations, along with tracking such complaints since 2004.

- Sustained (allegation proven)
- Not sustained (insufficient evidence exists to clearly prove allegation)
- Exonerated (alleged facts were justified)
- Unfounded (alleged facts did not occur or officer was not involved)
- Failed to file (complainant did not follow-through on initial complaint)
- Resolved (incident handled without a formal investigation)



Department Information

In 2010, the Rockford Police Department Community Services Unit (C.S.U.) continued its mission to provide excellent service to our citizens.

The C.S.U. strives in this commitment by providing rapid and thorough response to criminal issues and neighborhood concerns as well as offering proactive, alternative and educational approaches to problem solving. By doing so, the C.S.U. enhances the quality of life in every neighborhood in our city by making Rockford a safer place to live, work and flourish.

The C.S.U. rises to meet these challenges through the diligent work of its supervisor and Community Service Officers as well as providing the following services and programs:

•Neighborhood Watch

Community Service Officers (C.S.O.'s) are available to assist neighborhoods in starting a neighborhood watch. Officers will assist with notifying neighbors, presiding over the first meeting, and addressing crime problems in their neighborhoods. They will also act as a liaison to other units of government that may be able to assist with problems in their areas.

•Crime Free Multi-Housing

The Crime Free Multi-Housing program is a unique, three-phase certification program for rental properties of all sizes. This program is designed to reduce the incidents of crime at rental properties.

•Home Security Surveys

The Rockford Police Community Services Unit would like to help you make your home or business an uninviting target for burglars. C.S.O.'s, certified as Level II Crime Prevention Specialists, are available to conduct a security survey of your home or business. During this survey, officers will prepare a written report and provide you with recommendations for increased security. These officers are able to provide tips on the obvious things such as locks and lighting as well as suggesting ways to landscape your property in such a way that it discourages criminals. Whether you have an existing home or are considering building a new one, we encourage you take advantage of this free service.

What's New?



In our ongoing strive to improve, the Rockford Police Department unveiled several initiatives as well as continuing successful programs in 2010. Our dedication to enhance the quality of service we provide to the public are reflected in these new and continued endeavors.

•Offender Watch



Provides to citizens of Rockford sex offenders living in the City of Rockford by utilizing the City's website. The system is utilized by over 1300 police agencies in over 40 States. This tool is utilized by the Rockford Police Department on a daily basis to monitor and assist in keeping sex offenders in compliance.

•NIXLE

Nixle is the first identity-certified and secure communication service that allows local, county and state law enforcement and government agencies to connect with residents over cell phone, email and web. The primary function of Rockford Police Department's

outlets in the area of significant crimes, major traffic accidents, and other newsworthy information.

•Crimemapping.com



Crimemapping.com is an interactive mapping software application that allows users to view incidents and locations of crimes committed in the City of Rockford. This web-based application allows anyone with internet access an immediate view of city crime data. Data is updated daily and presents a detailed snapshot of crime activity within the City of Rockford.

•Leads Online

Is an application that has lead to an efficient way of transaction reporting for area pawn shops, stores, second-hand dealers, and scrap metal dealers. The system also reviews customers names for known terrorists and narcotic traffickers. Leads Online is used in over 1500 Police agencies in all states making this a valuable investigative tool.



What's New?

•Electronic Source for Accident Information

In our continued efforts to improve customer service to our citizens, we have found a way to allow our citizens to access their accident reports on line. All traffic accidents that are submitted to IDOT will have a copy sent to Docview. Docview specializes in the imaging of traffic accident reports, allowing individuals to print copies of their accident report online 24 hours a day, every day, from the convenience of their home.

•Open House



In May of 2010, the Rockford Police Department held an open house at the Public Safety Building. The event included several demonstrations by department personnel and static displays of department equipment and vehicles as well as guided tours of Police Department.

•CAPS Program



More than 50 participants graduated from the Rockford Police Department Citizens Police Academies held in the spring and fall of 2010.


•Youth Police Academy

Crime Statistics



COMPSTAT—(COMPUter STATistics or COMPARative STATistics) is the name of the Rockford Police Department's accountability process originally developed by the New York City Police Department. CompStat is an organizational multifaceted management tool designed to reduce crime, improve quality of life, and manage personnel and resources.



CompStat employs Geographic Information Systems intended to map crime and identify problems. In monthly meetings, Rockford Police Department personnel meet to discuss emerging trends and patterns. They devise effective ways to rapidly address these problems and evaluate past responses to prior concerns by *Improving Policing Through Accountability*. This goal is accomplished by employing the following four premises:


1. Accurate and timely data




Number of People Arrested / Cited for All Offenses





No one can make your home 100% burglary proof. But there are some simple steps you can take to minimize your chances of becoming a victim of this violating crime.


- Lock all outside doors and windows.
- Shut and lock the garage door.
- At night leave one or more lights on in locations not visible from windows, or use inexpensive plug-in timers that will turn the lights on and off.
- Always answer your door, but never open it to strangers. Use your door viewer peephole and talk to the person through the door.
- Require all service people and sales representatives to show proper identification. (Uniforms alone should not be considered as proper I.D.)
- If strangers telephone or come to your door, don't indicate that you are alone.
- You should have a telephone located in your bedroom for quick access.
- Keep window shades down and curtains closed at night.
- Please report any suspicious sounds, activities, automobiles or people to the police.

In 2010 The Rockford Police Department Traffic Division was recognized by the Alliance Against Impaired Motorists for having the highest number of DUI arrest in the State of Illinois (excluding the City of Chicago).

In 2010, we nominated 10 officers and investigators who qualified for the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) DUI Enforcement Award, each having arrested at least 25 impaired drivers since Jan. 1, 2001.

We will continue to monitor our officers performance in this area and will nominate each officer who achieves this level of enforcement in the effort to save lives within our community.

In 2010, the Rockford Police Department finished 2nd in the nation in the "National Traffic Safety Challenge", and received an award from the State of Illinois for "Impaired Driver Special Enforcement".




DUI Arrests / Number of People Arrested

Traffic News & Stats

The Traffic Division of the Rockford Police Department responds to the needs of its community by utilizing

data-driven "hot-spot" enforcement areas in an effort to reduce the number of overall crashes and injuries. Along with this effort, the Traffic Unit continually works alongside community members and community leaders to respond to specific reports of traffic-related issues from within the community.

The effort to reduce overall crashes and traffic-related injuries focuses primarily on the "Fatal Five" issues of:

- *improper lane usage*
- *following too closely*
- *speeding*
- *safety belt usage*
- *impaired driving enforcement*

The Rockford Police Traffic Unit participate in various statewide seasonal enforcement efforts, such as "Click It Or Ticket" and "You Drink. You Drive. You Lose." In addition, we investigate and respond to complaints within each district of the city, to better serve our citizens.

Some of our additional reduction programs include:

- *Full-time DUI Task Force, along with impaired driver saturation patrols, which resulted in Rockford having the highest number of impaired driver arrests in the state (743 arrests in 2010) for the past 3 years*
- *"30 Means 30" speed reduction campaign*
- *Seat belt enforcement zones to reduce injuries and increase seat belt awareness*
- *"Saved By The Safety Belt" community recognition awards to citizens who were saved from death or serious injury because of safety belt use*
- *Speed Enforcement Zones in "hot-spot" area approach corridors that are indicated to have a high-incidence of speed-related crashes*


