**Re:** 2011 – 2015 Capital Improvement Program Amendments

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Department of Public Works (DPW) staff presented the Draft 2011 – 2015 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to the members of the City Council on January 5, 2011. The plan provides extensive investment in all categories across the CIP. The program also provides funding for the completion of the majority of the projects outlined during the 2007 1 Cent Sales Tax (Infrastructure) Referendum.

The accomplishments of the program, however, are much more extensive than what was originally envisioned in 2007. The additional funding (over previously levels generated using the General Obligation Bonds) has not only allowed greater investment in our arterial/collector system, but has also created an environment of greater leveraging of state and federal funding. The program has expanded funding for storm water/flood control projects, the replacement/rehabilitation of many of our small bridges (and expansion of the funding for the bridge category), multiple neighborhood and arterial sidewalk projects, the expansion of crack sealing and other maintenance activities. The program is also on-track with the large scale, legacy projects (i.e., Morgan Street Bridge, West State Street, Riverwalk, South Main Street, etc.). A summary map and year-by-year spreadsheet (Appendices section of the draft 2011-2015 CIP document) provides an overview of the significant Neighborhood and Arterial/Collector projects completed from 2007 through 2010.

The initial presentation to the Committee of the Whole on January 22, 2011 again laid out the 2011 program, including a vision for the future. The 2011 highlights are the commencement of the construction of Morgan Street Bridge, Riverwalk – Museum Campus, as well as the resurfacing of important arterial/collectors throughout the City. Discussion regarding the Neighborhood Program and needs throughout other parts of the City were noted.

The second meeting of the Committee of the Whole took place on Monday, January 31, 2011. At this meeting several suggestions for revisions and project considerations were

discussed amongst the Council members and staff. There were also requests for further clarification for some categories noted with the 2011 document. Based on these discussions, City staff has prepared a series of revisions (and requested clarifications) to submit to the Committee of the Whole for consideration.

## 2011

**Arterial/Collector Patching:** In 2009 and 2010, the Department of Public Works (DPW), through the CIP process, began a program of full width patching on various arterials and collectors. These targeted patching projects have proved successful on such locations as Ohio Parkway, Ridge Avenue, and Rural Street. The objective is to provide full lane width patches in areas where deterioration and cracking have created a driving surface that will no longer allow rehabilitation, yet other portions of the same road section can be maintained. This allows flexibility within the CIP planning framework to actually move projects either forward or back within the schedule to address needs that may have become more critical. Based on this approach, DPW proposes the following:

- Fulton Avenue (Patching): Harlem – Huffman \$100,000 (ST)
- Rural Street (Patching): Calvin Park – Prospect \$100,000 (MFT)

To provide funding for these two projects, DPW proposes to reduce the Riverwalk – Museum Campus (MFT) funds by \$100,000, and reduce the \$375,000 (Sales Tax) allocation for the multi-use path/lighting for the West State Street Corridor project to \$275,000.

**Arterial/Collector – Additions:** DPW staff has been working with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) District 2 (D2) to resurface/rehabilitate IL 70 (Kilburn Avenue). IDOT D2 has confirmed that they will be undertaking the resurfacing of Kilburn, between Jefferson Street and Glenwood Avenue, in 2011. Since the project is a state route, the bulk of the project will be paid for with State funds. IDOT has, however, asked the City to consider paying for additional paving work within the parking lanes across several sections of the road, as well as other curb & gutter and median repairs. DPW believes these repairs provide an excellent opportunity to leverage state funds. Based on this approach, DPW proposes the following:

- IL 70 (Kilburn Ave.) Resurfacing: Jefferson – Glenwood \$75,000 (ST)

This project will bring an additional \$830,000 of IDOT investment into the City. DPW proposes to reduce the CIP Project Development category budget from \$200,000 to \$125,000.

**Sidewalk, Pathway, Roadway Enhancement Program (Clarifications):** Several Council members requested clarifications of the funding source for the following projects:

- East State Street Streetscape: Rock River – 1st Street \$500,000  
(River Edge Funding)

- West Side Streetscape: 200 N. Main St. – 200 S. Main St. \$500,000  
(River Edge Funding)

This funding is from the River Edge Re-Development Program, through the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) and should include costs for both design and construction. This revisions will be added to the final version of the 2011-2015 CIP document.

***Economic Development – City Center Improvements (Clarifications):*** During the two previous Committee of the Whole meetings, additional clarification was requested for the specific projects contained within City Center Improvements category (totaling \$225,000). DPW provides the following:

- Downtown Streetscape – Planters (as originally proposed): \$65,000
- Downtown Streetscape expansion (combined with the \$500,000 of River Edge funding to expand the improvements from Elm to Chestnut, and Mulberry to Jefferson): \$125,000
- Concrete Street Light Pole Replacement (Mulberry): \$35,000

*Note: During Committee of the Whole meetings, it was suggested that the City Center Improvements funds could be possibly applied to the resurfacing of Mulberry Street from Wyman Street to Winnebago Street. The total budget for that project is approximately \$475,000, thus exceeding the existing 2011 or 2012 allocation for that category. DPW staff will continue to work with IDOT, and/or seek other funding opportunities for this project.*

## 2012

***Arterial/Collector – Additions:*** DPW offers the following:

- Broadway Resurfacing: Extend from 14<sup>th</sup> St to 11<sup>th</sup> Street \$200,000 (ST)
- Harlem Blvd. Resurfacing: (Church to Auburn) \$650,000  
(MFT/ST)

The funds that will offset the expanded Broadway improvement will come from reallocation of \$200,000 for the South Main Street Corridor project. Approximately \$800,000 of funding still remains in 2012 to support the South Main Corridor project. DPW staff believes that additional state funding, or efficiencies in design, can bridge this funding reallocation.

To offset the inclusion of the Harlem Blvd. project, DPW proposes reducing the Riverwalk – Museum Campus MFT allocation from \$700,000 to \$450,000 (MFT), and eliminating the construction of the Shiloh-Trainer Gap project (\$400,000 Sales Tax).

***Economic Development – City Center Improvements (Clarifications):*** The following is further clarification of the 2012 City Center Improvements (\$240,000):

- Downtown, Westside Streetscape – Sidewalk and Streetscape Improvements (Project in conjunction with other funding efforts lead by retired federal judge, Stanley Roszkowski to improve the sidewalks, functionality, and aesthetics of the west side downtown core). \$100,000
- Downtown Streetscape Expansion (see 2011): \$50,000
- Concrete Street Light Pole Replacement (Mid-Town / 7<sup>th</sup> Street): \$90,000

We look forward to furthering the discussions regarding the 2011-2015 CIP Program.
